The committee undertook this exercise through sittings at the AAK Secretariat where the entire staff and candidates



The Committee observed that existing election process is inefficient and prone to abuse and therefore likely to bring the Association into disrepute. Further, the election process as provided by the AAK constitution allows sitting officials as well as secretariat staff to participate in conducting the elections, a matter that requires review.

The Committee recommended that:

- 1. The AAK membership database needs to be urgently updated and confirmed by the secretariat so that a proper voter register can be available.
- 2. The scrutineers need to be facilitated by the governing council to set up a secretariat outside the AAK to conduct future AAK elections as well as facilitate security for the election materials.
- 3. A modern and efficient voting system for AAK that will be acceptable to the membership needs to be identified and implemented for future elections
- 4. Sitting AAK governing council members who are potential candidates should in good faith disqualify themselves from participating in any election preparation process and an appropriate amendment to the constitution should be put forward to the next AGM or SGM.
- 5. Although the committee was able to narrow down to the likely perpetrators of the malpractice, it was not possible to pin point the actual culprit because of the many loose ends and the fact that the ballots were exposed to many people at the secretariat before the posting commenced. All candidates who so wish should be allowed to re-run for the elections.

4. SCRUTINEERS REPORT ON ELECTIONS OF PRESIDENT AND VICE-PRESIDENT OF ARCHITECTURAL ASSOCIATION OF KENYA

Report of the Scrutineers presented by Eng. Ratna Hirani (Chief Scrutineer).

AAK Annual General Meeting of 26th March 2015 adopted the Scrutineers report that cancelled the election of President and Vice President of the Association and recommended the adoption of an electronic voting system. The AGM mandated the Governing Council to hold re-elections for the President and Vice President within three months. The Chairman of the College of Fellows nominated a Committee of Fellows to carry out the investigations and report back to the college.

While the above investigations were being carried out the GC proceeded to put in place a new voting system. M/s. Infotrak Kenya were commissioned to develop a mobile phone based electronic voting system for conducting the elections. The Association appointed the same three Scrutineers (Ratna Hirani, Peter Kibinda and Robert Kariuki) to oversee the election process as provided for in the AAK Constitution and By-Laws, 2015 amendments. AAK also contracted M/s. Autodoc IT to perform an independent audit of the system and the process.

The Chairman of the College of Fellows submitted their Report dated 6th May 2015 on Investigation into the circumtances that led to cancellation of the 2015 AAK Elections to the Scrutineers with the recommendation that any or all candidates who contested in the February / March elections and who wished to contest again be allowed to re-run in the elections.

The mobile phone based electronic voting was conducted by M/s. Infotrak Kenya on Tuesday, 23rd June 2015 from 0600hr to 1900hr and was constantly monitored by the Independent Auditors Ms. AutoDoc IT.

The Scrutineers were also in the picture throughout the process of the elections. According to AutoDoc IT, despite a number of challenges, the e-voting system performed what AAK had contracted Infotrak to deliver.

Having evaluated all the aspects of election process, e-voting and Auditor's Report the Scrutineers consider that the process resulted in a transparent elections and accurate results. None of the hitches noted by the Auditors was significant enough to alter the results.

From the above results the Scrutineers recommend that Mr. Waweru Gathecha with 220 votes be declared winning candidate for the post of President AND Ms. Emma Miloyo with 216 votes be declared winning candidate for the post of Vice-President.

The Scrutineers note that of the total 619 eligible voters 316 people participated i.e. voter turnout of 58.3% which is much better than the March 2015 elections.

Noted that nearly half the number of eligible voters did not respond to call to vote and members were encouraged to actively participate in Association affairs.

Also noted that a number of members were unable to vote, having not paid their annual membership subscription by 31st March 2015. Agreed that this position is supported by the AAK Constitution and By-Laws and members should ensure to settle their annual subscriptions in good time.

- d) There being two contested positions (Chairman and Vice Chairman), the AAK Secretariat commenced preparation of electoral material.
- e) These were inspected by the Chief Scrutineer on Thursday 26th February at the AAK Secretariat in the presence of the AAK Hon. Secretary and Executive Officer and was found to be accurate. A physical count of all ballots (1,034 No.) was conducted.
- f) Postage records presented to the Scrutineers however showed that only 930 ballots were posted. A total of 102 ballots could not be accounted for, with 2 ballots being returned on account of a double entry.
- g) The scrutineers further received numerous complaints from members who did not receive their ballots.
- h) Having being unable to obtain satisfactory account for the missing ballots, the scrutineers arrived at a unanimous decision to cancel the election of Chairman and Vice Chairman pending a full investigation.

Comments from members:

- a) Members expressed their displeasure following indication of electoral malpractice that led to cancellation of the exercise and called for a speedy inquiry onto the conduct of the election and repeat process.
- b) Noted that the AAK election process as currently structure is inefficient and open to abuse.
- c) Members agreed that the Association must adopt a modern electoral system, noting that appropriate technologies exist to conduct an electronic election exercise.
- d) It was therefore agreed that:
 - i. The election of AAK Chairman and Vice Chairman be cancelled;
 - ii. The AAK College of Fellows to conduct an urgent and detailed into the conduct of the election process and submit a report to members within ninety days;
 - iii. A repeat election be conducted within a period of ninety days and a special General Meeting of the Association be convened to receive the results;
 - iv. The AAK Governing Council to immediately initiate a review of the electoral process with a view to developing a modern system, utilising available technologies.
 - v. The Governing Council; was mandated to engage the services of suitably qualified and experienced information systems experts in the development of an electronic voting system.

Annual Report of the Governing Council presented by Waweru Gathecha, AAK President

ESTEEMED MEMBERS OF THE ARCHITECTURAL ASSOCIATION OF KENYA

Allow me to begin by thanking you all most sincerely for having made time to attend this Annual General Meeting, the 49th in the life of our respected Association. This day marks the halfway point of the 29th Session of the Association; I appreciate all of you here present and the many other not present, for your support and contribution to the well being of AAK over the past year. It has been a privilege to serve you as President of the Association, and with humility I thank you all for the great honour and responsibility you have bestowed upon us - the Governing Council, and all other office bearers of this wonderful Association.

I offer special gratitude to members of the Governing Council whose continued dedicated service to the Association has enabled us make important steps toward realizing our vision of being the leading professional organization in the built and natural environment in the Region; kindly and unreservedly appreciate them all.

I also recognize and appreciate the staff of the Association, led by our most capable Executive officer Mr. Jacob Wanyoike Mwangi, and all who have worked hard to keep the AAK Secretariat active, and have helped deliver important programs and services to our members; again I request that we generously appreciate them all.

In the year since our last AGM, we have sadly lost some of our professional colleagues; I request all members present to rise in a moment of respectful silence, in remembrance of our dearly departed colleague A.S. Sehmi, a long standing member of the Association who passed away in July 2015. May his soul rest in eternal peace.

Ladies and Gentlemen of AAK, I will now present to you the Annual Report of this Association, primarily a record of the numerous activities and programs your Association has undertaken in the last one year:

1. AAK | INSTITUTIONAL SUSTAINABILITY

As I have reported to members over the last two years, the Governing Council of the Association has taken on an ambitious process of restructuring the Association so as to enable it operate more efficiently and effectively and deliver better services to members.

This exercise has been guided by the AAK Strategic Plan (2013 – 2018) and AAK Institutional Sustainability Report (2014), recommendations from which AAK G.C. has acted upon. These documents have been shared with members and are available at the AAK Secretariat and on its website.

The implementation of these plans is well on course. Towards this end, and as follow up to my annual report of 2015, I am pleased to report that the following planned initiatives have been implemented:

1.1. G.C. COMMITTEES

The standing Committees of the Association were constituted in July 2015, and are now fully operational. These are:

1.1.1. Advocacy & Communications Committee, convened by the Vice President, AAK
1.1.2. Membership Services Committee co-convened, by the Hon. Registrar and Asst. Hon. Secretary
1.1.3. Administration and Finance Committee, co-convened by the Hon. Secretary and Hon. Treasurer
These committees are now firmly entrenched in the AAK Constitution and By-Laws, 2015 Amendments, ref. BL 12.12.

1.2. HUMAN RESOURCE

Further to above, the Association has planned to recruit additional staff at Manager level to provide operational support to each of these committees. The vacancies were announced in the Daily Nation of 12th November 2015 and which was followed by a rigorous selection process involving the respective committees. After a careful assessment of the proposed recruitments against the Association's financial position and other programs, the AAK Governing Council has approved the recruitment of 2 managers as a start. I am pleased to inform you that the AAK Governing Council has approved the hiring of:

1.2.1 Elizabeth Anyula as Administration and Finance Manager





1.2.2. Ms. Faith Dikirr as Advocacy and Communications Manager

Ms. Dikirr will assume office on 4th April 2016, and Ms. Anyula on 1st May 2016. We trust that the addition of these new staff members will go a long way in enhancing the capacity of the AAK Secretariat to cope with demand for better services to members. A decision regarding the recruitment of a Membership Services Manager will be made at a later date.

Members will also note that a Motion has been placed before members today to amend the AAK Constitution to create office of the Chief Executive Officer to complete the implementation of the proposed human resource structure.

Finally, I inform members that the employment contract of Ms. Rachael Musya who served as Accounts Assistant at AAK was terminated by the Governing Council, in January 2016, on account of gross misconduct after discovery evidence of misappropriation of Association funds amounting to Kes. 566,035.00. This matter has since been reported to the police to pursue criminal charges against the said person, and to seek recovery of the stolen funds. Further, the Association is presently in the process of recruiting a firm to conduct a thorough forensic audit of all financial transactions of AAK, to cover the years 2013, 2014 and 2015.

1.3. CORPORATE GOVERNANCE TRAINING

AAK held a one day Corporate Governance Training / Induction session for Governing Council and Standing Committee Members, on Friday 23rd October 2015. Training was facilitated by the respected Centre for Corporate Governance. Going forward, AAK Governing Council commits to hold such training / induction sessions at the beginning of each Session of AAK to help encourage adoption of good corporate governance practice within the leadership of the Association, and to induct new GC members and office bearers into the corporate affairs of AAK.

1.4. MANAGEMENT INFORMATION SYSTEMS

The implementation of a modern membership and financial information management system has been a key pillar in our effort to modernize the AAK Secretariat and enable delivery of superior services to members. I am pleased to inform you that the AAK Governing Council has recently approved the implementation of Sage Evolution - a world class Enterprise Resource Planning (ERP) System at AAK Secretariat. The Software has already been secured from Sage East Africa and implementation of the system is ongoing.

The successful implementation of this project will result in a fundamental transformation on the manner in which we conduct business with the automation of our critical business processes including membership records management, accounting, reporting and communication. The new system also includes a Customer Relationship Management (CRM) module that will enable staff at the AAK secretariat handle membership issues in a timely and professional manner. We will keep members updated on progress being made as we anticipate commissioning the new system by 30th April 2016.

AAK | OFFICE PURCHASE - SPACE 605, BLUE VIOLETS PLAZA 2.

The Association has continued to pursue the matter of purchase of office space. Below I appraise members on progress made so far in this matter:

- 2.1. Second Amended Trust Deed: As you will recall, during the last Annual General Meeting, new members of the AAK Registered Trustees were nominated by members to replace retiring members. This necessitated an amendment and registration of the AAK Trust Deed. The AAK Second Amended Trust Deed was therefore registered on 15th November 2015, as required in Law.
- 2.2. Remittance to the AAK Registered Trustees: The Association has remitted to the Trustees a sum of Kes. 9,939,250.00 from commencement of this exercise, including Kes. 8,500,000.00 from AAK program surpluses, and Kes. 1,439,250.00 being the full development levy collected during 2015. G.C has has committed itself to transfer all development levy monies collected to the Trustees in the first week of every quarter; the next tranche will be released during the first week of April 2016. Members should note that the target of funds to be raised from Development Levy collection, based on January 2015 membership numbers, was Kenya Shillings six millions; having collected only shillings one and a half million, the Association is under achieving in this aspect. I request all those who are yet to pay this amount to do so within the remaining period of 2016.
- 2.3. The AAK Registered Trustees have remitted a total of Kes. 11,800,000.00 to the property vendor, keeping the property acquisition well on course. We thank all members who have paid their development levy due and appeal to those who have not paid to do so as soon as possible to keep the project on course. At this point allow me to recognise one of our own, Architect Charles Kahura. He has been extremely understanding in his forbearance; indeed I dare say that without

him, this transaction would be considerably more difficult. Kindly applaud this fine gentleman.

The event was also a financial success with a gross revenue of Kes. 16,289,200.00, and a net surplus of Kes. 3,710,769.00.

This year's Convention will be held on 10th - 13th August at the same venue. We encourage many more members to participate in this event that has seen phenomenal growth in the recent years. Registration is now open at www. aakconvention.com with exciting early booking discounts.

3.2. AAK Awards of Excellence in Architecture

The AAK Duracoat Awards of Excellence 2016 in Architecture, organised by the Architects Chapter Council, climaxed at the very successful dinner held at the Intercontinental Nairobi on 18th February 2016; another resounding success for the. The event was successful and received wide media coverage. Basco Products Limited has committed to sponsor the AAK Awards of Excellence in Architecture in 2018 and 2020, and we are looking forward to an even larger participation in 2018. On behalf of the entire Association, please join me in applauding the Chapter Council, the competition participants, the winners, and the wonderful jurors who sacrificed their time and resources to ensure a successful outcome. Separately, and in particular, I wish to recognize M/s Basco Products Ltd, led by their erstwhile managing director Mr Kamlesh Shah, for the continued support they have provided to this activity since its inception. 
AAK | FINANCIAL PERFORMANCE 2015 4.



INCOME

Notes to the financial statements For the year ended 31 December 2015

Summary of Significant Accounting Policies 1.

The principal accounting policies adopted in the preparation of the financial statements are set out below. These policies have been consistently applied over the years presented unless otherwise stated.

a) Basis of preparation

The financial statements are prepared in compliance with International Financial Reporting Standards (IFRSs). The financial statements are prepared under the historical cost basis of accounting and presented in the functional currency Kenya shillings (Kshs) rounded to the nearest shilling.

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with IFRS requires the use of estimates and assumptions. It also requires management to exercise its judgment in the process of applying the association's accounting policies. The areas involving a higher degree of judgment and complexity, or where assumptions and estimates are significant to the financial statements are disclosed in note 2

Adoption of new and revised international financial reporting standards

At the date of approval of these financial statements the following revised standards and interpretation were in issue but not vet effective:

- IFRS 2- Sharebased payment
- IFRS 3- Business combination
- IFRS 8- Operating Segments
- IAS 1- Presentation of Financial statements
- IAS 23- Borrowing costs.
- IAS 27- Consolidated and Separate Financial Statements
- IAS 32- Classfication of Rights Issue

The adoption of these standards and interpretation, when effective, will have no material impact on the financial statements of the association.

b) **Financial Instruments**

Financial instruments carried on the statements of financial position include cash and cash equivalents and payables. The particular recognition methods adopted are disclosed in the individual policy statements associated with each one of them.

c) Investment Property

Investment properties are treated as long term investments and carried at market value determined from time to time by external independent valuers. Investment properties are not subject to depreciation. Increase in their carrying amounts is credited to revaluation and other reserves in equity. Decreases that offset previous increases of the same asset are charged against revaluation and other reserves. All other decreases are charged to the statement of their comprehensive income.

d) **Revenue Recognition**

Revenue is recognized to the extent that is probable that the economic benefits will flow to the association and the revenue can be reliably measured. The following specific recognition criteria must be met before revenue is recognized.

Interest on deposits Revenue is recognized as the interest accrues

Rental Income

Revenue is recognized as the interest accrues

e) Foreign currency transactions

Transactions during the year are converted into Kenya shillings at rates ruling at the transactions dates. Assets and liabilities at the reporting period which are expressed in foreign currencies are translated into Kenya shillings at rates ruling at that date. The resulting differences from conversion and translation are dealt with in the statement of comprehensive income in the period in which they arise.

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f) Payables.

Payables are stated at their nominal values.

Cash and cash equivalents g)

Cash and cash equivalents comprise cash at bank.

For the purposes of the cash flow statement, the year end cash equivalents comprise cash and cash equivalents as defined above.

h) Taxation

The current taxation is provided for on the basis of the results for the year as shown in the financial statements, adjusted in accordance with the tax legislation

i) Provisions

A provision is recognized in the statement of financial position when the association has a present legal or constructive obligation as a result of past event and it is more likely than not that an outflow of economic benefits will be required to settle the obligation and it can be reliably estimated.

Contingent liabilities i)

Contingent liabilities are possible obligations whose existence will be confirmed only by uncertain future events or present obligations where the transfer of economic benefit is uncertain or cannot be reliably measured. Contingent liabilities are not recognized but are disclosed unless they are remote.

k) **Related** parties

In the normal cause of business the association enters into transactions with related parties. The related party transactions are at arms length.

Critical Accounting Estimates and Judgments 2.

Estimates and judgments are continually evaluated and are based on historical experience and other factors, including experience of future events that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances:

12. Financial risk management objectives and policies

Financial risk management

The association's activities expose it to a variety of financial risks: market risk including price risk credit risk and liquidity risk. The association's overall risk management programme focuses on the unpredictability of financial markets and seeks to minimize potential adverse effects on the association's financial performance.

Risk management is carried out by the management under policies approved by the board of trustees.

Credit risk

None of the financial assets that are fully performing has been renegotiated in the last year. Exposure to risk has been quantified in each financial asset note in the financial statements along with any concentration of risk.

Liquidity risk

Prudent liquidity risk management implies maintaining sufficient cash, the availability of funding through adequate amount of committed credit facilities and the ability to close out market positions. Due to the dynamic nature of the underlying businesses, the association's management maintains flexibility in funding by maintaining availability under committed credit lines.

13. Fund Risk Management

The association manages its funds to ensure that it will be able to continue as a going concern while maximizing the return to members through optimization of the debt and equity balance. The association is not subject to any externally imposed capital requirements.

14. Tax Status

The association is a nonprofit generating organization but has not obtained tax exemption on its income. It earns bank interest which is subject to withholding tax.

15. Contingent liabilities and commitments

There were no contingent liabilities and commitments due to third parties as at the end of the financial year 2015.

16. Currency Risk

The association operates wholly within Kenya and its assets and liabilities are reported in the local currency. It is therefore held no significant foreign currency exposure as at 31st December 2015.

AAK will never lack members? With over 95% of potential members outside the association all it will take is another visionary to create a progressive association which will spell doom to AAK.

Financial and administrative autonomy of the chapters is myth. This is the case in the constitution but with all membership fees and subs going to GC coupled with the executive structure where chapters report to GC this autonomy is a myth. We are operating a centralised system not a devolved system.

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THE FACTS

In one hand the silent policy of the executive that the chapters should die a natural death. On the other hand the Silent policy of the chapters with other homes (Second wives). When you ask they say they are just here so if there is any opportunity they will get their share. When you ask the status quo why they keep the chapters when they all have second homes they say they have nothing to lose having them around. Addendum to Report of the President - Appeal to Members of the Architectural Association of Kenya to Contribute toward Office Purchase

Background

The Architectural Association of Kenya has, over the last three years worked on an ambitious project to buy an office suite to host the AAK Secretariat. The Association has identified a suitable office suite at the Blue Violets Plaza, Kindaruma Road, off Ngong Road. This project is expected to cost Kes. 26 million, including purchase and complete fit-out of the new office suite.

This office suite, purchased by the AAK Registered Trustees on behalf of the Association is expected to provide much needed room for growth of the AAK Secretariat as we plan to hire additional staff and deliver more programmes for the benefit of members and the industry at large. It will also contribute significantly toward the institutional sustainability of your Association as we endeavour to build a solid ground on which our Association will transform itself into a world class business membership organization.

Project Status

The Association has remitted a total of Kes. 8,500,000.00 to the AAK Registered Trustees, being surplus generated from Association activities. We have also remitted additional sum of Kes. 1,439,250.00 being full amount of development levy received from members during year 2015. The AAK Registered Trustees have, in turn, remitted a total of Kes. 11,800,000.00 to the property vendor. This amount includes the surplus that the AAK Registered Trustees have accumulated over time from rental income received from Mucai Drive property. That leaves us with the onerous task of raising additional Kes. 14,200,000.00 to complete the project.

The Association continues to implement its programmes as planned and we anticipate to raise additional surpluses that will be channeled to this office purchase project. Having carefully considered the Association's cash flow projection, the AAK Governing Council is confident to raise and transfer additional Kes. 8 Million to the AAK Registered Trustees over the next one year to enable completion of payment for office purchase component.

The Association is also considering other fundraising options with a view to do away with or significantly reduce the need to borrow from financial institutions. This will save the Association significant interest expense that would then be channeled toward providing better membership services.
